## Ringing at Hessle in Memoriam – Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

On the evening of Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> September, we had just started ringing a quarter peal at 6.30 p.m. to celebrate the forthcoming marriage of a friend of two of our ringers when we received the news that Her Majesty the Queen had passed away. That was the end of our ringing for that evening. Early the next morning, Barry, Stuart and Sam went up the tower to fit muffles (circular pieces of leather with Velcro straps) to both sides of the clappers for each of the bells, except the tenor (the heaviest bell) which was only muffled on one stroke. Ringing fully muffled in this manner is something which is only done on very rare occasions, one of them being the death of the reigning monarch, and it makes a solemn sound with the tenor tolling on alternate strokes.

The arrangements for ringing to mark the passing of the Queen were something the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers had agreed some time ago, in consultation with the Church of England and the Royal Household. At 12 noon on Friday 9<sup>th</sup> September, along with bells throughout the United Kingdom and further afield, All Saints' bells were rung to mark the passing of Her Majesty.

The muffles then had to be taken off because, according to protocol, following the proclamation of King Charles III on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> September any ringing on the bells had to be open (i.e. unmuffled) until after 1 p.m. the next day. This was fortunate for the couple who were married at All Saints' Church that Saturday as their wedding bells could be rung open – muffled mournful bells are probably not appropriate to celebrate a marriage!

In the meantime, after the ringing on Friday, Ros and Barry set off for a holiday in North Wales with a group of ringing friends. We rang muffled quarter peals (a set piece of ringing lasting around 45 minutes) in memory of the Queen at St Peter's Church in Ruthin, Denbighshire on the evening of Friday 9<sup>th</sup> September and at the Church of St Oswald King and Martyr in Oswestry in Shropshire on the afternoon of Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> September. On Monday 12<sup>th</sup>, Stuart and Christine joined the group in North Wales and during the rest of the week we rang to mark the Queen's passing at several other towers in the area, some that otherwise would not have been rung due to lack of sufficient ringers in the local band.

Our ringing for the Sunday morning Eucharist at Hessle on 18<sup>th</sup> September was fully muffled and we then rang again before the Commemoration Service later in the day.

One set of these will be brought out and used for half-muffled ringing on Remembrance Sunday in November, but it will hopefully be many years before both sets are needed to ring the bells fully muffled again.
